Why This Matters



Global Crisis

Wildlife trafficking is a huge global problem worth billions of dollars annually



Social Media Effect

Social media makes it easier than ever to buy and sell wild animals



Targeted Species

Parrots, primates, and otters are among the most targeted animals online



Hidden Complicity

Many people don't realize they're part of the problem by engaging



Why These Animals?



They're adorable —
and that's the problem



Videos of baby monkeys
and otters go viral



People start wanting them
as pets



Traffickers rush to meet
the demand

How Social Media Plays a Role

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Content Spreads

Cute videos of exotic pets go viral across platforms

Desire Grows

Posts make wild animals look like easy, lovable pets

Sellers Emerge

Traffickers hide in plain sight among legitimate posts

Instant Contact

Buyers can reach sellers with a single message

*The cycle of **viral content** → **demand** → **trafficking** repeats with every share*

How Traffickers Hide



Coded Language

Words like “re-homing” or “adoption” disguise illegal sales



Private Messages

Move conversations to encrypted apps to avoid detection



Fake Rescues

Pretend animals are “rescues” to appear legitimate



Emoji Codes

Use emojis instead of words to bypass platform filters



Otters in the Trade



Asian small-clawed otters are especially targeted



Viral videos and “otter cafés” fuel demand



Most pet otters are taken from the wild



Families are torn apart during capture



Why Otters Don't Make Good Pets



Space

They need big pools and lots of room to roam



Noise

They're loud, social, and extremely active animals



Stress

They get stressed and aggressive in home environments



Outcome

Many end up abandoned or dead within months

The Bigger Impact



Wild populations shrink as animals are removed from habitats



Ecosystems get thrown off balance without key species



Sanctuaries and rescue centers struggle to keep up



Veterinary checks and health screenings are bypassed. Human health risks include parasites and harmful bacteria that are spread by otters.



What's Being Done



Platform Bans

Major platforms ban wildlife sales — but enforcement is spotty



AI Detection

AI tools try to detect and flag illegal posts automatically



International Law

International laws like CITES protect many endangered species



NGO Tracking

Conservation organizations track and report trafficking activity

How You Can Help



Stop Sharing

Don't share videos of wild animals as pets — even if they look cute



Report Posts

Use built-in reporting features on major platforms to flag suspicious posts



Spread the Word

Awareness saves lives — share the truth with friends and family
